

NOMINATE

- This game is in memory and honor of Bárbara Selfridge, Banterweight, who loved pass and fold games and loved politics
- 1968 was a great political year. It isn't an election year yet but we already have lots of candidates.
- In this game, your table is running a slate of candidates for office.
- How to play:
 - Pick a slip of paper from the envelope. You'll see the name of a real person or fictional character. That's your candidate. There are more than enough names in each envelope for each table so if you don't like your candidate, you can be disloyal and ditch that one and back another one, I mean take another slip from the envelope.
 - You'll get a piece of paper. At the bottom you'll see the office that your candidate has been nominated for. Every office is either a real current or historical office, or an office held by a fictional character. We didn't make any of these up.
 - At the bottom of your piece of paper there's a blank, like _____ is running for Galactic President. Write the name on your slip of paper in the blank, so that it will say who is running for the office.
 - You're going to be writing stump speeches for your candidates.
 - As these games usually work, you write something, fold the paper down (on the line?), and pass it to the next person, who writes the next thing, and so on.
 - Now there is a restriction. Down the side, you'll see the letters spelling out the word NOMINATE. What you write has to start with the letter you see to the left of the space where you're about to write. So the first person has to start with an N, and they write and fold the paper down and pass it. And the second person has to start with an O, and they write and fold the paper down and pass it. And the third person has to start with an M. And so on.
 - If you write more than one sentence, each sentence has to start with your letter.
 - Be persuasive! Your candidate's future depends on this! Possibly even the future of the galaxy!
 - If you don't know anything about the person, make it up. This is politics, not real life.
 - When you're all done, everyone reads your speeches out loud. You can vote for the winner if you want. No dirty tricks allowed!
